

Barnardos New Online Introduction to Child Protection Course



Barnardos has created a new elearning course, Introduction to Child Protection, that will be available soon on our website. This course is free to use and will be of use to anyone working with children. The aim of the course is to give an understanding of key aspects of Children First, the different categories of abuse, your role and responsibilties under Children First and how to handle concerns within your organsisation. There is information of the role of the designated liaison person, how to support a child during a disclosure, the importance of Child Protection policy and procedures. There are quizzes and sample scenarios throughout to confirm your learning as well as links to useful resources.

HelpMyKidLearn.ie

Help My Kid Learn is a new website for parents, guardians and childminders of children aged 0 – 12 years. The purpose of the website is to provide fun activities that parents can do with their children, to develop their literacy and numeracy skills. www.helpmykidlearn.ie mixes the old with the new, from card games and hopscotch that

help practice maths, to children's e-books that can be read out to your child and "Apps" that you can download to help your child learn. Information is broken down into 5 age groups: 0-2 years, 3-4 years, 5-7 years, 8-9 years and 10-12 years. Activities are organised into 5 areas of learning: Talk, Play, Read, Write and Count.

Childcare and Afterschool Care Survey

We in Barnardos are **exploring ways to improve childcare and afterschool care in Ireland**. At the moment, services vary a lot. They can be very expensive and can range in quality with some depending on unqualified or under-qualified staff or volunteers. We would really like to hear from you on this topic – your present experiences and how future services should be shaped. Even if your children are not currently using childcare or afterschool care, we'd still like to hear your opinions on how it should work.

We would really appreciate if you could take just five minutes to **complete our short survey on this topic**. The survey is part of our joint work with OPEN, National Women's Council of Ireland and Start Strong. The survey is open now and will run until **Sunday 24**th **February 2013**.

The results from this survey, which will be totally anonymous, will form part of our seminar being held on 4th March and will be used in ongoing work for improving childcare and afterschool care for all children in Ireland.

Ministers Quinn and Fitzgerald launch Action Plan on Bullying

On 29th January a new <u>Action Plan on Bullying</u> was launched by the Minister for Education and Skills, Ruairí Quinn T.D. and the Minister for Children and Youth Affairs, Frances Fitzgerald T.D. The Plan sets out twelve actions to help prevent and tackle bullying in primary and second level

schools. These proposed actions build on the work that is already underway in many schools to prevent and tackle bullying.

Barnardos has supports around bullying <u>for children aged 6-12</u>, for <u>parents of children 6-12</u> and <u>parents of teenagers</u>, as well as <u>online support for teenagers</u>.

Family Relationships and Family Well Being: A Study of the Families of Nine-Year-Olds in Ireland

Parents' education (especially that of the mother), and not whether or not the parents stay together, is a more important factor in children's well-being, a study on Family Relationships and Family Well Being has found. Researchers at UCD found there was virtually no difference in well-being between children of different family types, including step-families and single-parent families.

This study, launched by Minister for Children, Frances Fitzgerald TD, called <u>Family Relationships and Family Well Being: A Study of the Families of Nine-Year-Olds in Ireland</u>, was carried out by UCD's School of Applied Social Science, where researchers looked at the circumstances of more than 8, 500 nine-year-olds.



On 28th January, the Department of Education and Skills

launched "Guidelines for Developing Textbook Rental Schemes in Schools". Barnardos has been a long time advocate of introducing book rental schemes in all schools as they have proven to reduce the school book bill to parents. Barnardos' CEO Fergus Finlay said 'All children deserve to get the best education they can, but the high costs associated with school taints many children's experience and perception of education and reinforces

Survey on Income and Living Conditions (SILC) 2011

CSO figures published today for 2011 show the ravaging affects of recession on children and families in Ireland. The publication EU Survey on Income and Living Conditions 2011 shows that children and families were the worst hit by the recession, reflected in the increase in the consistent poverty rate for children from 8.8% in 2010 to 9.3% in 2011.

Barnardos has particularly highlighted the stark increase in deprivation rates for one parent families to 56% in 2011. Barnardos' Head of Advocacy, Catherine Joyce, said: 'Some one parent families have seen a €60.26 decrease in their weekly income since 2009. Today's figures clearly indicate the affect that this is having on those families. The lack of adequate supports for one parent families, including recent decisions to reduce financial supports, clearly needs to be addressed to ensure that children do not suffer further.'

Early Years Care and Education



Early Learning Scheme Boosts Reading and Maths Skills

The National College of Ireland's Early Learning Initiative - a scheme aimed at helping youngsters in disadvantaged parts of Dublin's Docklands area - has resulted in a rise in educational achievement in English and maths, a study has found. Research published in February into the work of the Early Learning Initiative at the National College of Ireland found that students are now scoring above the norms in other similarly disadvantaged communities. The initiative, started in 2008, involves a parent-child home visitor programme to help parents to teach their children skills toget them ready for learning.

Assessments showed that as of November 2011, 30 per cent of children in the first year of the programme could describe, with ease, a storybook picture using words or sentences. A year later, more than three-quarters of the same children were able to perform this task.


The research into the programme by the Children's Research Centre at Trinity College found it was helping to create a "high-achieving, supportive and cohesive Docklands community".

for early years educators that





It also gives guidance on what early years educators can do if there are concerns about a child's speech, language and communication development, how to address those concerns, and how to support children while waiting for speech and language therapy.
