News and Developments

Community Childcare Supports Extended

On 15th February, Minister for Children and Youth Affairs, Dr Katherine Zappone, announced extra support for children, parents and community childcare services with immediate effect. The Minister has announced that:



- Community services are to be allowed register children for the CSS (Community Childcare Subvention Programme) on a yearround basis for the first time ever.
- €1m is being made available to community childcare services
 who have been facilitating the placement of Community
 Employment (CE) scheme workers, to ensure these services
 are supported to meet the minimum qualification requirements
 under the early years regulations.

Access Inclusion Model

Katherine Zappone, Minister for Children and Youth Affairs, has also announced the expansion of the Access Inclusion Model which ensures children with disabilities can fully participate in the free preschool years. €1.5m is to be invested in a scheme



and 18 new posts created to offer help and support to children, parents and childcare providers.

Podcasts for the Early Childhood Care and Education Sector

Roscommon County Childcare Committee, in collaboration with Longford County Childcare Committee and the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment, have launched a series of 15 podcasts to assist and support the early years sector nationally in their pedagogical practice with the children they care and educate.


The podcasts focus on Leadership, Pedagogical Leadership in ECCE

Governance and Practice, Intentional leadership, Creating Rich Vibrant Environments and Endorsing the Six Life Skills for Children.

Action Plan for Education 2017

On 6th February, Government announced the <u>Action Plan for Education 2017</u>.

There are a number of actions relevant to early childhood care and education in the Action Plan, including a goal to increase quality of learning in early years: 'Early childhood is a crucial stage of life in terms of a child's physical, intellectual, emotional and social development. Growth of mental and physical abilities progress at an



astounding rate and a very high proportion of learning takes place in the early years. It is a time when children particularly need positive early learning experiences to lay the foundation for later school success. We recognise that the provision of high quality professional development opportunities for early years practitioners is needed to improve the quality of the learning experience for our youngest learners.'

Child Poverty

Figures released by the CSO at the beginning of February show that one child in every nine is living in consistent poverty in Ireland. This is equivalent to 132,102 children or the entire population of Mayo. Other findings include:

- In 2015, 11.5% of children (aged 0-17) lived in consistent poverty.
- Consistent poverty means that these children are living in households with incomes below 60% of the national median income and experiencing deprivation based on the agreed 11 deprivation indicators. This can mean going 24 hours without a substantial meal or being cold because parents are unable to afford to heat the home. It means not having two strong pairs of shoes, or a warm jacket to keep out the cold.
- Nearly three in five (58%) of lone parent households with one or more children experienced deprivation. Worryingly this is more than double the level of depravation experienced by families with two adults with children (25.2%).
- In 2015 the annual average disposable income had increased from €18,864 in 2014 to €20,000. The concern is that lower income families are still struggling while it is the middle and high income earners are enjoying the recovery.
- Those who are unemployed in 2015 face significantly higher risks of experiencing deprivation (45.5%) and consistent poverty (26.2%), and being at risk of poverty (43.5%), compared with the rest of the population.

Shared Parenting Survey

At the end of January, One Family published the results of its <u>Shared Parenting Survey and accompanying policy recommendations</u>. Some of the key findings of the survey include:

 The majority of respondents whose child does not live with them most of time, spend time with their child on a weekly basis.




- While almost 27% of respondents
 arranged this time amicably between them, for almost 51% it
 was agreed with difficulty, through mediation or court ordered.
- 62% of respondents whose child lives with them most or all of the time stated that their child's other parent contributes financially to their child's costs; 38% stated that the other parent does not contribute financially.
- Over 50% of respondents stated that they do not make decisions jointly on issues that impact on their child(ren).
- Over 34% of respondents have attended mediation.

Children's Rights Alliance Submission to the Department of Children and Youth Affairs on the Single Affordable Childcare Scheme

The Children's Rights Alliance has developed a submission to the Department of Children and Youth Affairs (DCYA) to inform the development of the Government's Single Affordable Childcare Scheme (SACS). While welcoming many of the proposed elements of the Scheme, the submission recommends the following changes to the Single Affordable Childcare Scheme:

- The design of the SACS be changed from an hourly subsidy based on childcare attendance reported weekly, to a child-centred capitation grant, in line with the Free Preschool Year and primary school.
- The Scheme demand that childcare centres use national early years quality practice standards (Síolta) and the national early years curriculum (Aistear) in return for receipt of public funds.
- Ireland's early years and school-age childcare systems need much more investment than they receive now.
- SACS requires that the DCYA take the lead in developing an Implementation Plan, in conjunction with relevant government departments and agencies.
- The SACS is one funding element of the Early Years Strategy, due in early 2017. The Early Years Strategy, due since 2013, should include adequately-funded policies and strategies that lead to the best outcomes possible for children and their families. It should include a range of options for children's education and care, including Parental Leave and flexible working arrangements.
- Children in Direct Provision and children of undocumented parents should have access to the childcare subsidy.
- The DCYA should consult with the Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission and the Data Protection Commissioner or the Ombudsman for Children on the privacy implications of sharing data arrangements proposed in the Schemes.


